MESSAGE FROM SCOUT EXECUTIVE

As I reflect on the year behind and plan for the year ahead we have many reasons to be proud:

- For the third consecutive year we experienced growth in Cub Scouting, Venturing, and Exploring, and at year-end 5,766 registered youth were enjoying Scouting in Grand Canyon Council:
 - 2,781 Cub Scouts in 93 packs.
 - 2,817 Scouts in 153 troops.
 - 56 Venturers in 13 crews.
 - 112 Explorers in 7 posts.
- 3,038 Cub Scout rank advancements were earned, including 412 Arrow of Light awards.
- 2,527 rank advancements (including 292 new Eagle Scouts) and 10,923 merit badges we earned by our Scouts.
- 50,670 hours of community service were reported from Eagle Scout Service Projects and another 22,672 total hours of community service were reported by our units.

From a staff perspective, I'm proud to highlight that two of our team were selected to become Scout Executives of other councils in 2023:

- Davis Fox was selected in June to become Scout Executive/CEO for the Hawk Mountain Council, based in Reading, Pennsylvania. Davis is also one of our former Boy Scouts and an Eagle Scout from this council.
- Dave Jarvis was selected in December to become Scout Executive/CEO for the Oregon Trail Council, based in Eugene, Oregon.

Our Summer Camps were highlights of the year for many, and our camps were lauded by BSA NCAP Visitation Teams



for their excellence. Our spring and fall camporees and activities were successful and Scouts, leaders, and parents had great fun while learning and experiencing outdoor adventures.

Maintaining our 4 camps for year-round use is an expensive investment and a significant part of our operating expenses. Year-end financials aren't complete as I write this, but it appears that our financial performance exceeded budget.

These successes require a lot of people – Den Leaders & Scoutmasters, merit badge counselors and Unit Commissioners, District Executives and members of the Executive Board, and more all contributed to our shared successes. Arizona's future is a little brighter for all the good work that went into 2023 and we're poised for greater successes as we look ahead to 2024.

Thanks for everything you do to make Scouting an adventure in Arizona.

INTRODUCING OUR 2024 SCOUTS OF THE YEAR

Meet our outstanding 2024 Scouts of the Year – Morgan, Gideon, Ella, Vaughn, Mayzie, and Ryan! These young leaders have demonstrated exceptional dedication, leadership, and a commitment to the values of Scouting.

Mayzie Richins, a pioneering member of the inaugural girl cohort in Scouts BSA, swiftly reached First Class within 18 months. Serving as Senior Patrol Leader (SPL) for Troop 3050, she inspired peers, later taking on roles like Assistant SPL and Scribe. Attending the Council's 2021 NYLT session, Mayzie reprised her SPL role for an extra year. Now 3050's Junior Assistant Scoutmaster, she dedicates herself to coaching fellow Scouts. As a diligent Life Scout, Mayzie actively works towards completing her final Eagle requirements.

Eagle Scout Vaughn Grosse, now Junior Assistant Scoutmaster for Troop 8051, is a founding member and two-time President of Venturing Crew 8051. As a dedicated recruiter, he mentors and leads both units, actively coordinating community service opportunities. Pursuing a Law & Public Safety CTE course, Vaughn aspires to become a Firefighter. Notified on October 11th, 2023, he received approval for the Heroism Award from the National Court of Honor Committee. Nominated for Heart of Yuma's Outstanding Youth Leader in 2020 and 2022, and Gila River District's Scout of the Year Honorable Mention in March 2023, Vaughn's impactful actions speak louder than accolades.

Gideon Akaelue, a Life Scout and Order of the Arrow member in Troop 653, embodies Scout values from Cub Scouts to his Eagle journey. As Senior Patrol Leader at Camp Geronimo, he excelled in leadership, earning the Big G Gold award. Transitioning to Troop Guide, Gideon's commitment to mentoring and Scout principles makes him deserving of recognition.

Ryan Martin, a model of Scouting's mission for resilient servant leadership, held key roles like Troop Guide, Patrol Leader, ASPL, and SPL. Leading Troop Leadership Skills Training (ILST), he volunteered as a module trainer since 2020. Known for resilience and commitment, Ryan pursued and secured every desired role. As 2021 SPL, he attended NAYLE in West Virginia, later returning as an instructor in 2022. Expanding his impact, he served as Assistant Youth Course Leader for NYLT in Germany and Japan. Achieving Eagle rank in 2023, Ryan led a 9-day Canoe Trip in Minnesota. Beyond Scouting, he applies leadership in Basha High School's JROTC program.

Morgan Willis, a Scout for almost a decade, co-founded Scouts BSA Troop 3030 in 2019. She achieved a Philmont Trek, Sea Base Out Island Adventures, and the Paul Bunyan Award for Conservation in 2022. As Troop 3030's Senior Patrol Leader in 2023, she earned the Big G Gold and led Troop 4245 during the 2023 Jamboree female contingent. Trained in Outdoor Ethics, Leave No Trace, NYLT, and NAYLE, Morgan also excels in music and has academic and JBOTC achievements.

Ella Miller, a Life Scout since 2019 with Troop 944 in Baltimore, smoothly transitioned to Troop 3015 in Cave Creek after moving to Arizona in 2022. An exemplary Scout, she showcases intelligence, maturity, and physical fitness, actively engaging in community service and excelling as a recruiter. As Troop 3015's Senior Patrol Leader, Ella prioritizes earning her Eagle Scout rank while managing school responsibilities. Known for resourcefulness, financial acumen, and supportive leadership, she embodies Scout values both in and out of uniform, backed by her dedicated Scout family.

RACING TRADITION: GRAND CANYON COUNCIL SCOUTS TAKE THE LEAD AT THE PINEWOOD DERBY OPEN AT BARRETT-JACKSON AUCTION WESTWORLD OF SCOTTSDALE

Grand Canyon Council BSA teams up with Barrett-Jackson Car Auction for the third annual Pinewood Derby Open in a thrilling blend of tradition, craftsmanship, and speed. Held at Barrett-Jackson Westworld of Scottsdale on January 20, 2024, this event showcased the timeless Pinewood Derby, bringing families together and celebrating the spirit of Scouting.

The Grand Canyon Council's CEO and Scout Executive, Andy Price, expressed his excitement about the partnership, stating, "The tradition continues for its third year at Barrett-Jackson, and we are honored to be a part of it."

The Pinewood Derby, initially introduced in California in 1953, challenges Cub Scouts and their parents to transform simple materials – wood, plastic wheels, and nails – into custom race cars weighing five ounces or less. The goal is to create a sleek, speedy, and visually appealing car. Bringing this historic Scouting tradition to Barrett-Jackson adds a unique automotive flair and allows event sponsors to connect with like-minded enthusiasts and professionals dedicated to youth-focused initiatives.

At the Pinewood Derby Open, held against the backdrop of Barrett-Jackson auction prestaging lanes, more than 30 Scouts unleashed their creativity on the track. The custombuilt Pinewood Derby cars raced down the lanes, showcasing the Scouts' dedication to craftsmanship. The event received special recognition as AZ Family 3 TV featured the exciting races, elevating the Pinewood Derby Open to even greater heights.

A round of applause is due for the Pinewood Derby Champions: Shaun N., securing 1st place, followed by Andrew T. in 2nd place with his speedy derby car, and Xander L. claiming 3rd place with pride. The event's success wouldn't have been possible without the participation of Scouts, families, and friends who made this day memorable.

TROOP 531'S UNIQUE APPROACH TO WELCOMING NEW SCOUTS

Troop 531's Trail to Adventure: A Crossover Celebration





Scouts BSA Troop 531, located in North Phoenix and proudly chartered with Trailhead Youth Foundation, embodies the adventurous spirit and growth that defines Scouts BSA. Founded in October 2019 with just five boys, the troop quickly grew under the guidance of Scoutmaster Jess Rankin and the dedicated team of leaders. Fast forward to 2024, and Troop 531 stands proud with 71 Scouts and 10 Scoutmasters, with five of the original six boys now achieving the prestigious Eagle Scout rank.

Troop 531 engages in an annual planning meeting with a special PLC-only campout every April setting the stage for a year of thrilling adventures. The troop's calendar is packed with diverse activities, from sailing in the San Diego Harbor to rappelling an 80-ft cliff. In February, the Troop is gearing up for their own version of "Shark Tank" called "Scout Tank" as part of Entrepreneurship Month - a testament to their innovative spirit.

As youth transition from Cub Scouts to Troop 531, the troop's commitment to making the journey seamless and memorable shines through. The Crossover event is a grand affair, marked by Troop 531 swag and a warm welcome. What makes Troop 531 truly special is the post-Crossover camping trip, where new Scouts experience their first night camping "on their own."

Jess Rankin, Scoutmaster, highlights the significance: "Troop 531 has a strong bond with Pack 531, and our unique camping trip is designed

to let the new Scouts experience their first night 'on their own' with our leaders and experienced Scouts." The night includes setting up tents, learning Totin' Chip training, a night hike, and a campfire session with a musical twist, featuring everything from '80s hair bands to the timeless Rick Astley. As Rankin puts it, "The Crossover Ceremony and that first night of camping with the Troop should be special, not only to celebrate the accomplishment of earning the Arrow of Light (the highest rank in Cub Scouting, prepares a Webelos Scout to join a Scouts BSA Troop.) but to make their first Scouts BSA camping trip a great one!"

The troop's support extends well beyond the initial Crossover. Experienced Scouts use the EDGE method to teach Trail to First Class skills, fostering a sense of camaraderie among patrols (a mix of experienced and new Scouts). For parents, Troop 531 provides learning opportunities, encouraging them to play the role of a supportive coach at home and familiarize themselves with the Scout Oath and Law. A combination of Troop Parent Committee, Scoutmasters, and digital platforms ensures seamless communication and support.

Independence is a key focus for Troop 531, especially for Scouts experiencing their first camping trips without parents. The period between Crossover and June, when the troop heads to Camp Geronimo, becomes crucial. With intentional planning, registered Dads, and a balance between structure and fun, Troop 531 ensures Scouts build maturity and self-reliance.

Jess Rankin sums it up, "With a well-planned camping trip, the Scouts should be so tired, dirty, and having a lot of fun that they forget about video games and the fact that they just spent another couple of nights away from home." Troop 531 is more than a troop; it's a trail to adventure.

FROM EAGLE SCOUT TO PARK RANGER DIRECTOR: A 20-YEAR JOURNEY IN LAW ENFORCEMENT AND RESOURCE PROTECTION





My name is Michael O'Connor, and I received my Eagle Scout in 1997 with Troop 1565 in Washington State. I am now the Director of the Park Ranger Law Enforcement Academy at Northern Arizona University, and I wanted to share about my experience in scouting and how it helped shape a 20-year career in Law Enforcement and how some of you may find your way into working in the Resource Protection career field with one of our tremendous land management agencies.

As a young scout, I found myself enjoying the incredible outdoors that the Pacific Northwest has to offer. I traveled many miles on foot with a 40-pound pack through Olympic National Park, North Cascades National Park, and numerous areas managed by the United States Forest Service. I was very fortunate that my troop had excellent adult role models who shared with us their passion for the outdoors and instilled the value of Scouting. I always asked myself, "who protects these places? Who protects the people that are out here enjoying the wilderness?"

As I progressed through scouting, I took on leadership roles that helped shape the man that I would later become. I became a member of the Order of the Arrow and then went on to earn my Eagle Scout. Joining the ranks of Eagle Scout has been a life-changing experience. Throughout my career and life as an adult, I

frequently look back upon my days in scouting with pride and a sense of accomplishment. Still to this day, I have on my professional work resume that I am an Eagle Scout.

It wasn't until I decided to attend Northern Arizona University that I learned that the protector of our parks and forests are the people of the National Park Service, US Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, and the US Fish and Wildlife Service. NAU offered a program through their Parks and The Recreation Management Department trained these individuals on how to do these jobs safely, efficiently and with compassion.

Now over 20 years after completing this same program I am proud to say that I am the Director of the Park Ranger Law Enforcement Academy at Northern Arizona University. I have come full circle. I am now able to be a part of the incredible program that NAU has that was created by those who came before me and instill a passion for public safety, the outdoors, and education.

I challenge each of you to continue to live by the Scout Oath, to accept a duty to your country, to help other people at all times, to stay strong, to focus on your mental health and strength, and to follow your moral compass. Public safety and Natural Resource Law Enforcement agencies are looking for community members who possess these qualities and strengths to protect our national treasures and landscapes for all to enjoy.

I would encourage you to explore Northern Arizona University and become the next generation of students at the Park Ranger Law Enforcement Academy. *Michael O'Connor*, *Eagle Scout 1997*.







PLEASE SAVE THE GROMMETS FROM RETIRED FLAGS AT HOME, SCOUT UNIT, OR POST. IF YOU DO NOT CHOOSE TO RETIRE SYNTHETIC FLAGS BY FIRE, YOU CAN CUT OUT THE GROMMETS AND TURN THEM IN, EVEN WITH A SMALL AMOUNT OF FLAG MATERIAL REMAINING. We will remove the excess cloth.

USS Arizona (SSN-803)

CALL TO ACTION: The Arizona Sons of The American Legion are spearheading an effort to collect the brass grommets from as many retired national flags as possible. WHY? In 2025 (estimated), the 4th naval vessel to carry the name USS ARIZONA (SSN-803) will be launched. This will be the first time a vessel has held the name since 1941. We are jointly working to collect brass grommets to be combined with AZ-mined copper to create three brass bells to be presented to the Navy, with one to be selected as the new vessel's bell. ACTION: Please have your members and Scouts collect/save all brass grommets from retired or "to be retired" USA Colors and have them ready for a pick-up 19-24 February. Provide the name of the donor or organization (and their location) as they will become part of the bells' official history. 






WELCOME EAGLE SCOUTS!
